Where to Find Us at SHOWS from now till end of year ...


- **Home Economics Queensland Conference** Saturday 12th August at Brisbane Convention Centre displays and demonstrations, and hands-on workshops during their program on the day.

Technique of the Year for 2016 - Salty Sandwich

This is not meant to be a step by step description of the technique. The photos show the progression of the salt. They are not necessarily linked to the words beside them ... but hope this will help to inspire you. Call me if you'd like further information. Have fun with it!!!

BASIC PRINCIPLE: Choose colours from opposite sides of the colour circle for each piece of fabric – that is, one piece in warm colours, and the other piece in cool colours.

COLOURS USED in this EXAMPLE:

Bottom layer (it's covered) - **yellow, red, orange** (blended) [See bottom right for photo – the one above me!] **Top layer** – **purple, blue, magenta** (blended)

Scribble colours onto each piece of fabric randomly, fold in corners / edges and squish colours around to blend them. Lay each piece of fabric flat again, then rub over them to spread the colour into any uncoloured areas. Squeeze out excess GENTLY. Mop up on another piece of fabric of course!

Onto one piece, lay flat trails of salt about two fingers wide, leaving about four fingers width between the trails. (Rock salt or pool salt works best.) Place second piece of fabric on top. Touch down gently with your fingertips on the top layer, but not TOO much — it helps the process start.

Then enjoy watching it work over time. How long it will take depends on

the weather and how quickly the fabrics are drying.

HINT: Fabrics need to be reasonably wet when you put them together, but not 'excess' sloppy. So be careful not to squeeze out too much of the 'enemy'.

For your mop-up, it's interesting to put the excess from both pieces on the same piece of fabric. Because the colours are usually complementary (they're from opposite sides of the colour circle) there'll be some really exciting brown-y / murky bits in there that will go perfectly in the project for which you are creating your fabrics (eg lining of a bag, inside a book or folio cover.) If you don't want 'murky', use different pieces of fabric for each mop-up.

I wish I had 'stopped' this piece working as you see it at left! You can STOP the salt working at any stage – simply pop it out in the sun and

dry it more quickly.

LH photo has been left till the fabrics were dry. Photo at right is the bottom layer dry with salt still on it. Dark areas are where the salt has pulled the colour. The bottom piece was orange-y all over at the beginning. Rinse out salt when dry, and heat set as usual.

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HANDY HINT ... Covering your Painting Boards ...

Choose strong, non-perfumed plastic garbage bags ('Multix' brand are my favourites!). Slip the cardboard into the bag, and tape it thoroughly on the back with masking tape. A well-covered board will last you for YEARS !!! [See last season's newsletter for tips on keeping them clean.]
