Here's something different for you to try ... just for fun ... DOUBLE DIPPED SOCKS! ...



In the *Concepts Winter* issue last year, we looked at how to colour Stripey Socks on poles or drink bottles. Hope you've tried that. Hope you've also loved these very different socks as much as lots of other people do! Now for an interesting variation, for even more zing to your stripey feet. **METHOD**:

- 1. Colour the socks as before, and let them dry completely.
- 2. Take them off the pole / bottle / or whatever round objects you have used. No need to heat set them at this stage as the colour will not move or come out after it has dried.
- 3. Colour the socks again, using a different colour.
- 4. Rescrunch them onto the bottles or pole.
- 5. Allow to dry completely.
- 6. Heat set in the usual way. Remember the socks are best heat set with the heel underneath that is, as they would be if they were on your feet, and not 'side on'.

BRIGHT IDEA: try this for one-coloured fabrics on a pole too, doing it twice as for the socks. (Check out this pole technique on DVD #2, or ask me.)

Making the Most of Our Painting Techniques ... WORKING with SALTS and SUGARS ...

Salts, sugars, and other things that dissolve are wonderful for creating textured effects in your hand-coloured fabrics ... BUT it is VITAL that any of these substances are completely rinsed out after the fabric is dry, especially when you are planning to use these fabrics in your sewing machine. Salt and other sticky substances will play havoc with the 'workings' of your machine!

When Liquid Radiance is dry, it is stable in the fabric. It cannot be moved, or removed. When salts or sugars are dry, remove the crystals, most of which can be 'recycled' / used again. Rinse fabric in clean water (water will now be salty), then another lots of clean water to remove the salty water – then another lot of clean water to make SURE all saltiness has gone. For large fabrics, or really salty techniques, a couple more rinses are a good idea to make ABSOLUTELY SURE all traces of salt have been removed. Peg fabric on the line to dry, then heat set in the usual way.

Have fun with different salts. The size of the salt crystal (rock salt, pool salt, cooking salt, Epsom salts, table salt) determines the size of the markings – the bigger the salt, the bigger the markings (and so on). Salt draws the colour to it, and the colour stays in the fabric. When working with sugars, the size of the grains also determines the size of the markings, but the sugar dissolves in the colour and removes the colour from those areas when the fabric is rinsed. Sprinkle sugars very sparingly so you don't lose too much colour! BRIGHT IDEA: Hundreds and thousands are a great source of sugar! They make wonderful round markings, and the food colouring from them washes out when fabrics are rinsed.
