Salt Mountains – as seen in my project in *Embellish* magazine June '22

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Hi Fellow Teachers and Fabric Enthusiasts,

Winter? COOL! Summer? WARM! Seasons and colours are so closely related, and it's exciting to explore that relationship in our creativity. Working in analogous colours produces clean, clear effects, as in the 'Mountains' above. Analogous colours are those that are side-by-side on the Colour Circle. The cool colours are the greens through blues and into purple – makes sense really doesn't it!? - the colour of sea water, and deep ice and sky. The yellows, oranges and reds are the colours of sun and heat—yes the warm ones. I have a simple way of looking at colours, and it works for me. I'm sure as you read this you'll 'hear' my quick and easy philosophy loud and clear.

By using *either* cool *or* warm in techniques like Fold, Splot and Scrunch, or Fabric in a Jar, or Salt Mountains, the colours will remain clean and clear and not end up murky. These are all techniques where there is usually lots of blending and merging of colours as we work. When using colours that are separated on the colour circle in these techniques, we often find they will end up in browns or 'plasticine grey' as they mix together. Think of what happened to your plasticine or Playdoh when you were kids!

Another of my favourite hints, great for techniques where you are not 'smooshing' the colours together too much as you work – for example Five Finger Foam Brush, Spray Painting, Water Soluble Designing – is to start with an analogous series then add a touch of colour from the opposite side of the circle. If you are working in the purple side of the circle, add a touch of yellow or orange. When working in greens add a touch of red or magenta/pink. Putting this into practice will make your work zing and bring it to life. Colours on opposite sides of the circle are known as complementary colours, and MIXING any two complementaries will produce browns – the perfect shadow colour when blending and making colours flow from one into the other in many design techniques. Be aware to NOT use equal amounts of complementaries in a project though, as doing that will allow neither to shine. They will fight each other for dominance. So lots of purple with a little yellow, or lots of green with a little red (or vice versa for each of those colour groups) will achieve superb results.

I know there's so much more to colour theory than just that, but those simple thoughts have been my 'go to' for many years. When the artist in you wants to take it further, there's plenty of information 'out there', available for you to explore. HAVING FUN with colour is our aim, and to do it YOUR WAY is what makes *your* fabric designing *uniquely yours*.

I love this simple Colour Circle. Hope you learn to love it too. Download it from my Website, with its notes – hop into the Ed Centre, click on the Web Workshops page, and scroll down to the 'First Aid Kits' below the videos. Get into the Ed Centre, explore, and HAVE FUN!

Making the Most of our Painting Techniques ... Continuing the Colour Discussion ...

When I started my colour journey all those years ago, I was not confident in choosing colours for my projects. Hard to believe now, I know; but I remember it well. I would flip though magazines and junk mail looking for colour combinations that

appealed to me. In reality, what goes into print MUST have eye appeal to attract people, and I figured those preparing the publications would have a few clues that I didn't have



back then. I still have many of the clippings from the mags, smiling now at the use of analogous and complementary colours in the ads and photos, and the balance in what has become instinctive for me with practice. And it will for you too. Let's check out a couple of examples in these images ...

R: lots of magenta & red with just a little green for the background, using marbles & rubber bands to form the flowers

L: Lots of blues with a touch of yellow & orange in a Salted Sandwich (two of its layers shown)

May I encourage you to look at the sunset, the landscape, the play of the ocean waves breaking on rocks, ...the 'whatever' ... and notice things with 'seeing eyes'. We don't have to 'be confident in using colour' if we but look at what is around us and pick up a few clues along the way. Hope my thoughts help. Here's to many more creative years working together in colour ...
