COLOUR COMBING

Achieving a screen printed look without all the complications has never been so simple! Using this combing method, as well as prints and stencils, you'll have unique hand designed fabrics and garments in no time.

You will need:

- ☑ Flat paints in colours of your choice
- ☑ Masking tape 1.5 cm (approx ½ inch) or wider
- Ruler, or set square something with a flat edge to act as your paint spreader let's refer to it as a 'comb'
- ☑ Optional plastic tiling tool with zigzag edge available from hardware stores




METHOD:

- 1. Place fabric onto a surface to grip it firmly hold it with masking tape to an old rough sheet, or spray a piece of cardboard or firm plastic (eg a stencil sheet) and place fabric on that, smoothing it on with hand pressure.
- Lay out your design area using masking tape it must be no wider than your comb.
- 3. Place two lines of flat paint fairly thick lines, please on the masking tape, one close to the edge of the tape, and the other just behind it and touching it. Do not put the paint onto the fabric! The amount of paint you will need depends on the size of the design area and the absorbency of the fabric. Test on a sample piece first to get the feel of this technique.
- 4. Hold the comb upright and scrape the paint into the design area in a long continuous stroke, starting your stroke behind the second colour on the masking tape. The colour nearest the edge of the tape will be the first to hit your fabric. Holding the comb vertically will give different results from holding it at a 45° angle to the fabric. Firm pressure will cause the paint to travel differently from lighter pressure as you work. The colours will form their own pattern as you pull the comb or scraper across the design area. If you have applied sufficient paint onto the tape, the paint should pull about halfway down the area to be coloured.
- 5. Now work from the opposite end of your design area in the same way as in steps 3 and 4. After these steps, the design area should be covered in paint.
- 6. Look at the design formed ... over which you have very little control !! You may see a scene, or an underwater panorama, or Let the colours

- * Bare patches may happen in your design area where there has been insufficient paint to fill the area. These can be touched up with brushwork, or by adding simple stencil designs using rollers, or leave the bareness as part of the design.
 - * Apply any extra details when the base paint is dry (or almost dry). Remember that you are working on fabric that is already sealed with paint, so apply the extra paint carefully. Be gentle with your roller!
 - * When adding enhancements, keep a strong contrast between the background colour and the stencilled colour. For example, black, navy or other strong colours look great over bright colours; or Metallics or Flats for Dark Fabrics over dark backgrounds.

Play with this technique and find the combinations that appeal to you! It will keep you amused for hours!!!

The little 'scene' on the right was created by 'pulling' Blue and Electric Pink from the top of the picture downwards, and Navy and White from the bottom, upwards. There was an uncovered patch in the top area, so it was brush painted in with Gold Metallic Flat.
